2014 Annual Fire Report



MISSION OF THE HONEY BROOK FIRE COMPANY #1

is to minimize the loss of life and property resulting from fire, medical emergencies and other disaster; through fire prevention, fire suppression, training and education, emergency medical service and emergency preparedness.

Background:

The Honey Brook Fire Company has been serving the tri-county area of southeastern Pennsylvania since 1892. Currently, the Honey Brook Fire Company operates an engine, an engine/tanker, a rescue truck, a brush truck, a squad truck, a traffic control unit, a traffic sign board, 3 basic life support ambulances, and a command vehicle. With these apparatus we provide Fire, Rescue, and Emergency Medical Service (EMS) primarily to Honey Brook Borough and Honey Brook Township and a portion of West Nantmeal Township in Chester County as well as portions of Salisbury Township and Caernarvon Township in Lancaster County. We also provide mutual aid to numerous fire companies in Chester, Lancaster, and Berks Counties.

The Honey Brook Fire Company is a combination company whereas we have Career Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT's) manning an ambulance 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Volunteers supplement the career EMS staff as well as fully staff the fire apparatus. In 120 years since our beginning many things have changed but one issue has remained the same... the dedication of our organization to render aid to our community when help is needed. Throughout the years our membership has strived to provide the best possible services available through in depth and detailed training, high quality equipment, numerous fundraising efforts, and a willingness to go the extra mile to make our organization second to none.

2014 Achievements

Grants and New Equipment:

In January 2014 the Honey Brook Fire Company #1 was awarded \$20,710.71 from the Pennsylvania State Fire Commissioner Grant Program. \$13,619.31 of the award was for the Fire Company and was used to replace lockers that housed our Structural Firefighting Turnout Gear. The old lockers were made of wood and did not allow air to circulate throughout the gear to help dry it after responding to fires. \$7,091.40 was award to the EMS Division and was used to replace outdated storage cabinets for medical equipment, replace an oxygen refilling system and general building maintenance.

In October 2014 the Honey Brook Fire Company #1 completed a 2013 Assistance to Firefighters Grant Award for the replacement of all the hose carried on our Pumpers. The new hose is lighter, more maneuverable and manageable for firefighters to handle. It replaced some of our hose which some sections were 30 years old. The newer hose also allowed us to upgrade to 5 inch supply hose which is used to move large amounts of water between fire apparatus and allows us to be compatible with other neighboring departments.

Training:

Throughout 2014 members participated in training drills weekly and attend classes at County Training Facilities. Some of the weekly drills included, Engine Company Operations which drill on the ability to arrive at a fire, deploy the appropriate number and size hoses as quickly as possible and extinguish a fire. Crews visited local junkyards several times to practice extrication techniques of vehicles involved in automobile accidents. Members completed an Agricultural Rescue course through Penn State College which focus on the unique challenges of farms and farming equipment and removing trapped subjects from under tractors or patients that are caught in a piece of machinery.

Donation of Equipment:

In December, the Honey Brook Fire Company and several local fire companies got together and stockpiled equipment that was no longer being used by those departments for donation to fire companies in north central Pennsylvania. Honey Brook was able to donate to these companies all of the hose which had just been replaced by our federal grant, turnout gear that was no longer needed, as well as numerous hand tools and power tools. It's with a great deal of pride we were able to donate these items to fire companies tasked with doing the same level of fire protection to their communities that we are but are not funded near to the level they should be, some operating on only \$5,000 a year budget.




